

State Laws Prohibiting Minors from Using **Tanning Devices**

- Between \$0.88 and \$1.75 per pack (the national average)
- Smoke-free in workplaces and restaurants
- 25-49.9% of the CDC recommended funding level
- No type of counseling (individual, group, or phone) or no FDA-approved tobacco cessation medication covered for all enrollees
- Law allows for parental accompaniment under the age of 14 and parental consent between 14 and 18

BLUEPRINT FOR LEGISLATORS

For the sixteenth year, ACS CAN has published a blueprint for state legislators on how to save more lives from cancer. Framed entirely on evidence-based policy approaches, How Do You Measure Up? provides an outline of what states can do to reduce the cancer burden and provides a snapshot of how states are progressing on critical public health measures.

HANGING IN THE BALANCE

This year's report includes a special section that will become a reoccurring feature of the How Do You Measure Up? Report. The new "Hanging in the Balance" section will shed light on a timely topic each year. This year the section details how policies aimed at combatting opioid addiction in Florida impact cancer patients and survivors' access to pain treatment. ADDITIONAL SUCCESS

In 1999, the legislature created the Florida Biomedical Research Program, now known as the James and Esther King Biomedical Research Program, to award peer-reviewed competitive grants to researchers studying tobacco-related diseases. In 2006, the Bankhead-Coley Cancer Research Program was established, employing the same methodology to fund the best science in all cancers. The legislation was written to sunset in 2011, threatening the existence of both programs, but thankfully the legislature recognized their importance. In FY2018, the state awarded \$12 million to the King program and \$10 million to the Bankhead-Coley program.

CALL TO ACTION

The data in this year's edition of How Do You Measure Up? show that there is still much public policy work to be done to achieve our mission of eliminating suffering and death from cancer. It is estimated that nearly 1.7 million people in the United States will be diagnosed with cancer in 2018 and more than 600,000 people will die from the disease this year alone. ACS CAN is dedicated to ensuring that lawmakers enact state health policies that help prevent cancer and save lives.

In many cases, it costs the state little or nothing to do the right thing. In most cases, these solutions will save the state millions and perhaps billions of dollars in health care costs and increased worker productivity.
