Lynn Gerhart is the spokesperson for QRB Industries, and here's her story. My father, Ron Hack started QRB in 1963 while working as an X-ray technician. My parents bought an old house and store on the highway in Niles Michigan. My dad decided to put the commercial property to good use so he started out selling fruit. Later on he began to visit the dump and pick out old discarded furniture. He taught himself how to reupholster and started a small used furniture store.



He bought some paint remover to refinish some of the furniture but wasn't happy with what he found. None of the products worked very well, they damaged the furniture, and were expensive. Having some background in chemistry he decided to make something for himself.

He came up with something he liked and refined it over time. Customers coming into our store asked him what he was using that did such a nice job. A fter explaining it was his own concoction many of them insisted he sell them some. He would have them bring in a jar and he would fill it for a couple dollars. S oon he decided to design a label and start marketing his new invention. He called it QRB for "Quick Restored Beauty".

My father came home from the hospital one day and told my mom "I quit my job today!" My mother was very concerned, being the conservative one in the family. But it has worked out quite nicely. Later my father added Instant Finish, Match-a-Color S tain, and S cratch-Remover to the product line.



Over the years much of our advertising has been by word of mouth and we have a loyal following of customers. We think this is due largely to the fact that we are not just trying to sell a product but to teach people how to refinish furniture. In 1981 we started doing local television shows. We often could not show our product but we would announce that we would be at a flea-market or a fair and that people could bring their own furniture to try it on. T his proved to be a big success and thereafter we were convinced that *teaching* people how to refinish was the best approach. We have great products and we are sure you will agree if you try them.

SHOWCASING A COLLECTION

When showcasing any collection of items, keep in mind the following points:


- It's a big mistake to display everything "in line" or all spread out throughout the $\sqrt{}$ room.
- Harmony is achieved with color.
- Consider combinations of "short and fat" items with "shiney and matte" items.
- $\sqrt[]{}$ Crunch up table runners to unify groupings on a tabletop.
- When displaying picture frames, avoid having all the frames in a line. Create balance and scale by using three heights and place one large picture to the size or having two groups of odd numbers of pictures.
- Use greenery to add interest to a grouping.
- Repeat colors and mix textures for even more interest.
- Enjoy your books by displaying them so they can be seen. Their colors can compliment the group, and you can also add history by using vintage books.
- A basket can be placed on its side, and then add greenery, candles and small frames.
- Colors tend to unify items.
- Greenery is an embellishment and you should use some of it throughout the room. When considering a collection you want to display, sort it by category, sentimental value, somewhat treasured, or things that don't matter to you.
- $\sqrt{}$ When showcasing a collection of items above a sofa, keep in mind that the collection should take up 2/3 of the sofa and allow at least 3 to 4 inches between items.

The bottom line is to keep things close together when you're showcasing a collection of items.

Space-Saving Tips For The Home

Key to being organized is putting things in their proper place so they're easy to find when you need them. With space usually at a premium, look for storage alternatives by utilizing the space under beds and sinks. on walls and behind doors. Consider wicker baskets. hampers, boxes and chests of all sizes to store everything from personal papers and documents to clothing, linens and toys. Baskets can be stacked and used as



decorative accessories or placed under console tables, file cabinets are easily disguised with fabric covers and used as end tables or night stands. Following are more tips to help you get started.



For Bed And Bath

• Streamline closet space by getting rid of clothes you

haven't worn over the past year. Discard extra hanger wires. They take up valuable space. Group like articles such as jackets, blouses, shirts and trousers together so they're easy to find. Utilize the space above the clothes bar by installing shelves for storing out-ofseason clothes. Plastic see-through boxes are especially suitable.

- Increase under-the-bed storage by adding bed leg extenders. W rap storage boxes with VELCRO® brand Get-A-Grip® straps so they're easy to pull out from under and reseal easily.
- To conceal under-the-bed storage, a longer dust ruffle may be needed. Keep it in place by attaching it to the bed frame with VELCRO[®] brand Half & Half[™] tape.
- Bulky quilts and towels come down in size when encircled with a few GET-A-GRIP® Multi-Use straps. Keep a 9' roll handy in the linen closet.

- Create a rotating gallery of artwork by your future Picassos. Use clear sheet protectors or fashion poster size ones with clear vinyl and use VELCRO[®] brand STICKY BACK[®] coins. Update gallery as new pictures are created.
- Use a cheerful fabric to camouflage cluttered shelves. Attach fabric to shelves with VELCRO[®] brand Half & Half[™] tape. Affix the STICKY BACK[®] hook side to the edge of each shelf and the Sew-On loop side on the fabric. Press sides together to attach.



FURNITURE TECHNIQUES

Creating the Arts & Crafts Look

The Arts & Crafts style continues to surge in popu-larity,



prompting many homeowners and apartment dwellers to seek out both antiques from the original movement (1900-1929) and reproductions. However, both Arts & Crafts antiques and the new reproductions are expensive, but a third

alternative now exists: unfinished Arts & Crafts furniture. Using the same staining and finishing techniques and, in some instances, some of the same products, you can create the Arts & Crafts look for a small fraction of the cost of antiques or reproductions.

Creating the Stenciled Look -Without Stencils

While there is a wide assortment of stencils available for us, we still cannot always find the exact pattern we want. Or perhaps we find it, but not in the right size to fit our project. Rather than going to the trouble of designing and cutting your own stencil, you can create the stenciled look using art masking fluid.

Steps:

1 Apply wood conditioner to the piece and wait 15 min-

utes for it to dry.

- 2 Apply a base coat of water-based stain. Let dry.
- 3 Trace the outline of your design onto the wood, either freehand or using a pattern.
- 4 Fill in the outline using art masking fluid and a small brush. Let dry.
- 5 Apply a coat of stain over the entire piece.
- 6 Peal *off* the art masking fluid to reveal the design.
- 7 Protect the wood and the stain with a water-based finish.
