**KRWG-TV is the PBS station located in Las Cruces, New Mexico. We are licensed by New Mexico State University and our offices are located on NMSU's Las Cruces campus. KRWG-TV is proud to be the only television station in southern New Mexico. We also provide unique services in the El Paso, Texas/Las Cruces, New Mexico service area.**

**Through meetings with citizens and community leaders, partnerships with area newspapers and other organizations, and extensive production of news and public affairs programming, the staff of KRWG-TV has determined the following issues are of primary importance to our coverage area:**

**Health/Welfare/Safety – While the over-all crime rate is no higher than the national average, poverty and a higher than average teenage population contribute to a gang and crime problem. Poverty also results in health and welfare issues including an above average social services caseload and a high number of welfare cases handled by the local hospital.**

**Culture – The mix of Hispanic/Native American/ and Anglo cultures provide many positive attributes to life in southern New Mexico. Cultural and historical understanding is of great importance.**

**Business - With an above-average unemployment rate and a below-average income level, the status of the business/agricultural community in southern New Mexico is crucial. Concern over the constant issue of defense spending at the federal level is ongoing in this area due to the presence of several military and NASA installations. Dona Ana County is also actively seeking new businesses and a strong infrastructure exists near the Santa Teresa Border Crossing to boost border trade.**

**Politics/Public Affairs – Southern New Mexico and the United States have a wide variety of contentious political issues that are of constant interest to the citizens of the involved communities.**

**Education – With a constantly growing population of children, many of whom use Spanish as their primary language, the school systems in the KRWG-TV viewing area are constantly trying to provide facilities and teachers to meet this growing school age population with limited funds. New Mexico is one of the poorest per-capita states in the nation, which results in a chronic shortage of funds for local education.**

**Water/Environment – KRWG-TV is located in a desert with two major sources of water: the Rio Grande River and an aquifer that supplies**

**drinking water to Las Cruces and surrounding areas in the Mesilla Valley. Water is the lifeblood of the region and conflicts are escalating over the requirements of a growing urban population and agriculture.**

This week, *New Mexico in Focus* looks at the potential impact of bus passes on the health of young people in Albuquerque and revisits some of our favorite interviews and stories from the past year.

Producer Sarah Gustavus sits down with three members of *Together for Brothers*, an organization led by young men of color, to discuss the importance of transportation in the overall health of families and the community.

Maria Hinojosa, host of the nationally syndicated radio show *Latino USA* and president and CEO of the Futuro Media Group, was in our studio in April to talk to correspondent Russell Contreras about the representation of Latinos in the media, the current political debate about immigration, and changing identities in the United States.

Correspondent Matt Grubs sat down with author Annette McGivney to discuss her book, “Pure Land.” McGivney spent a decade covering the brutal murder of a Japanese hiker in 2006. Investigating the circumstances of that murder brought her face to face with her own past.

Two segments revisited this week come from the “State of Change” project, a collaboration with the Solutions Journalism Network and media partners across New Mexico. Correspondent Antonia Gonzales looks at four Pueblos in Northern New Mexico that will soon have access to broadband internet in their tribal libraries, after years without access to high-speed internet, and visits the dig site for the internet cable.

And *NMiF* producer Sarah Gustavus visits the SoloWorks program in Cibola County for a look at a job training program for remote workers. Some rural communities are encouraging work opportunities that do not require a commute. But there are challenges to working remotely, including learning how to manage customers by phone and getting the right internet connection to meet employer requirements.

This week, New Mexico in Focus looks at the Santa Fe International Folk Art Market, now celebrating its 15th anniversary. The IFAM has brought nearly 1,000 master folk artists to Santa Fe from around the world, resulting in an economic impact of millions of dollars to New Mexico. In addition, most of the money generated by artists' sales goes to help their home communities and promote traditions that have been passed down for generations. NMiF correspondent Megan Kamerick sits down with the market's CEO and two of the artists who will be at this year's market.

On this month's episode of Our Land, NMiF correspondent Laura Paskus explores Project Feed the Hood, a food justice program in Albuquerque that connects communities with healthy food and young people with the land (and a paycheck). Begun out of the Southwest Organizing Project, a 38-year old nonprofit focused on social justice, Project Feed the Hood operates the Ilsa and Rey Garduño Community Garden, and pilot programs at ten schools.

And Gene Grant and the Line opinion panelists debate President Trump's choice of Brett Kavanaugh to fill the soon-to-be-vacated U.S. Supreme Court Justice seat, and look at how changes in the makeup of the Supreme Court might affect New Mexicans. They also look at the effect on New Mexico workers of the recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling on labor union dues, and discuss the mistakes made by investigators in the case of a young girl's murder.

Along with covering the UNM Lobos and their team's scores, he has reported on financial troubles in the university's Athletics Department. The UNM Board of Regents' recent decision to cut four sports was unpopular with athletes and their community supporters. Grammer will talk about what he's uncovered in his reporting and why the business of sports matters for all NewMexicans.

Gene Grant and the Line opinion panelists discuss what's next for NewMexico in the wake of Judge Singleton's ruling on public education funding. They also debate reactions to the cut of four teams and ongoing financial troubles in the UNM Athletics Department.

Correspondent Matt Grubs sat down with author Annette McGivney to discuss her book, "Pure Land." McGivney spent a decade covering the brutal murder of a Japanese hiker in 2006. Investigating the circumstances of that murder brought her face to face with her own past.

Two segments revisited this week come from the "State of Change" project, a collaboration with the Solutions Journalism Network and media partners across New Mexico. Correspondent Antonia Gonzales looks at four Pueblos in Northern New Mexico that will soon have access to broadband internet in their tribal libraries, after years without access to high-speed internet, and visits the dig site for the internet cable.

And *NMiF* producer Sarah Gustavus visits the SoloWorks program in Cibola County for a look at a job training program for remote workers. Some rural communities are encouraging work opportunities that do not require a commute. But there are challenges to working remotely, including learning how to manage customers by phone and getting the right internet connection to meet employer requirements.

This week, New Mexico in Focus looks at the potential impact of bus passes on the health of young people in Albuquerque and revisits some of our favorite interviews and stories from the past year.

Producer Sarah Gustavus sits down with three members of Together for Brothers, an organization led by young men of color, to discuss the importance of transportation in the overall health of families and the community.

Maria Hinojosa, host of the nationally syndicated radio show *Latino USA* and president and CEO of the Futuro Media Group, was in our studio in April to talk to correspondent Russell Contreras about the representation of Latinos in the media, the current political debate about immigration, and changing identities in the United States.

Correspondent Matt Grubs sat down with author Annette McGivney to discuss her book, “Pure Land.” McGivney spent a decade covering the brutal murder of a Japanese hiker in 2006. Investigating the circumstances of that murder brought her face to face with her own past.

Two segments revisited this week come from the “State of Change” project, a collaboration with the Solutions Journalism Network and media partners across New Mexico. Correspondent Antonia Gonzales looks at four Pueblos in Northern New Mexico that will soon have access to broadband internet in their tribal libraries, after years without access to high-speed internet, and visits the dig site for the internet cable.

And *NMiF* producer Sarah Gustavus visits the SoloWorks program in Cibola County for a look at a job training program for remote workers. Some rural communities are encouraging work opportunities that do not require a commute. But there are challenges to working remotely, including learning how to manage customers by phone and getting the right internet connection to meet employer requirements.

This week, New Mexico in Focus looks at the Santa Fe International Folk Art Market, now celebrating its 15th anniversary. The IFAM has brought nearly 1,000 master folk artists to Santa Fe from around the world, resulting in an economic impact of millions of dollars to New Mexico. In addition, most of the money generated by artists' sales goes to help their home communities and promote traditions that have been passed down for generations. NMiF correspondent Megan Kamerick sits down with the market's CEO and two of the artists who will be at this year's market.

On this month's episode of Our Land, NMiF correspondent Laura Paskus explores Project Feed the Hood, a food justice program in Albuquerque that connects communities with healthy food and young people with the land (and a paycheck).
