

RESOLUTION NO. 12298

- WHEREAS. the State of Washington does not as yet possess enabling legislation to permit its cities to create local housing authorities as required by the Wagner-Steagall Low-Cost Housing Act; and,
- WHEREAS, there is every evidence, including assurances by the Governor of his active support, that such enabling legislation will be passed at the next session of the state legislature; and,
- WHEREAS, the limited federal appropriations rapidly are being allocated among the various states, creating the danger that all will be distributed before this state passes its enabling legislation; and,
- WHEREAS, it is hoped that an expression of intention by the City of Seattle will lead to an earmarking of funds for Seattle, conditioned upon the passage of the enabling legislation; Now Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE:

That it fully intends to create a Seattle Housing Anthority immediately upon passage of enabling legislation, and to cooperate in every way with the United States Housing Authority to bring to the City of Seattle the funds and benefits made available by the Wagner-Steagall Low-Cost Housing Act.
