Synopsis: (U) To open a preliminary Color of Law investigation and notify the Civil Rights Unit of the case opening.

Preliminary Investigation Initiated: 10/19/2015, set to expire 04/19/2016

Details:

I. Summary of the Predication:

On 06/11/2014, DAVID STOJCEVSKI was brought to the Macomb County Jail by the Roseville Police Department. STOJCEVSKI was arrested on a misdemeanor warrant for obstruction of justice. STOJCEVSKI appeared before a District Court Judge and was remanded to the Macomb County jail for 30 days, or pay \$772 fine. STOJCEVSKI was also referred by the judge to Community Corrections for probation. On 06/19/2014, the judge amended his order stating that STOJCEVSKI could be released from jail upon enrollment into the Community Corrections M.A.R.C.H program.

Upon intake into the Macomb County jail, STOJCEVSKI was asked questions regarding his health and he told the medical personnel he was

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taking methadone prescribed by a physician. The nurse, TIFFANY DELUCA noted on the intake form, that STOJCEVSKI showed obvious physical signs of drug abuse. DELUCA recommended that STOJCEVSKI be placed in the Medical Detox unit. STOJCEVSKI was placed in the general population on 6/12/2014.

On 06/17/2014, Corrections Deputy WILLIAM MACAVONI found STOJCEVSKI

Laying on the floor in his cell on his back, unable to speak and blinking his eyes. STOJCEVSKI was taken to the medical section of the jail. STOJCEVSKI was again returned to his cell in the general population. Later on 06/17/2014, STOJCEVSKI was referred to mental health because he was hallucinating and talking to people that were not there.

STOJCEVSKI was placed in a mental health cell on suicide watch. This section of the jail has 24 hour video coverage. While in the mental health cells, STOJCEVSKI was checked several times by the medical staff and taken on one occasion to see the doctor. STOJCEVSKI could be seen in the video several times standing in the cell talking to himself. STOJCEVSKI was provided food while in the mental health cell but ate very little and during the last five days in the cell did not appear to eat any food. From 06/25/2014 until he stopped breathing at 17:22 on 06/27/2014, STOJCEVSKI laid on the floor in his cell, shaking and blinking his eyes. The last medical check of STOJCEVSKI was conducted on 06/25/2014.

During STOJCEVSKI time in the mental health cell there were several corrections deputies on duty as well as several members of the medical staff. The investigation will determine which correction deputies and members of the medical staff, if any, showed deliberate indifference to STOJCEVSKI condition that lead to his death. On 06/27/2014, STOJCEVSKI was taken to the hospital and pronounce dead.

The video recording of Macomb County Jail (MCJ) inmate DAVID STOJCEVSKI, while in his cell in the Mental Health Section was reviewed. The video was reviewed on September 29, September 30, and October 1. This was an initial review of the video and was reviewed by using fast forward to view and stopping at certain portions of the video to view in real time. The video depicted STOJCEVSKI in the MCJ, Mental Health cell 1 from June 17, 2014, 15:42 until June 27, 2014, 17:47. The following was observed on the video:

June 17, 2014

- 15:42 The video begins. STOJCEVSKI entered the cell.
 16:20 What appears to be food was provided to STOJCEVSKI.
 19:21 A male MCJ Correctional Deputy, enters the cell, checks STOJCEVSKI pulse. The Correction Deputy used his radio.
 19:23 What appear to be three female nurses enter the cell.
 STOJCEVSKI appears to be given a medical examination.
 19:30 The three females and the Corrections Deputy exit the cell.

June 18, 2014

- 14:56 Two females, who appear to be nurses, and a male Correction Deputy enter the cell. STOJCEVSKI appears to be given a medical examination. The females have STOJCEVSKI move to a sitting position and have him drink from a cup.
 15:13 The two females and the Correctional Deputy exit the cell.
 19:16 A male Correctional Deputy enters the cell and appears to talk to STOJCEVSKI, who is laying on the lower bunk.
 19:18 A second male Correctional Deputy enters the cell and appears to speak with STOJCEVSKI.
 19:20 Three females, who appears to be nurses, enter the cell. STOJCEVSKI appears to be given a medical examination.
 19:24 The three females and the Corrections Deputies exit the cell.
 19:26 The two Correctional Deputies enter the cell. The take STOJCEVSKI, and the mat he was laying, from the lower bunk and place him on the floor. The two Correctional Deputies then exit the cell.

12:46 STOJCEVSKI appears to eat some food from the box left on the desk.

16:09 A male inmate (INMATE1) was put in the cell with STOJCEVSKI.

16:17 Two boxes of food was provided.

18:22 STOJCEVSKI takes a drink from the cup provided. STOJCEVSKI takes the box of food out of sight of the camera.

18:27 Sets the box down on the desk.

June 20, 2014

06:07 INMATE1 provided a shirt and appears to be taken out of the cell.

06:13 Food provided to STOJCEVSKI. STOJCEVSKI appears to eat some of the food.

09:47 A male Corrections Deputy and a female, appears to be a nurse enter the cell. The female appears to talk to STOJCEVSKI.

09:48 The Corrections Officer and the female leave the cell.

12:14 A male Correctional Deputy enters the cell with INMATE1. The Correctional Deputy bends over STOJCEVSKI and looks at him. The Correctional Deputy then brings in what appears to be food and drink.

13:33 A male Corrections Deputy enters the cell with a female, who appears to be nurse. The female appears to talk to STOJCEVSKI and hold his wrist.

13:34 The Corrections Deputy and the female leave the cell.

16:12 A male Correctional Deputy enters the cell. Appears to talk to INMATE1.

16:13 Correctional Deputy exits the cell.

16:20 Food was provided and set on the desk by INMATE1.

22:21 A male Correctional Deputy and a female, who appears to a nurse, enter the cell. A second Correctional Deputy also enters the cell. It appears that STOJCEVSKI was given a medical examination. STOJCEVSKI, who was laying on the floor, was set up and provided something to drink. It appears STOJCEVSKI drank what was provided to him.

22:28 The two Corrections Deputy and the female exit the cell.

13:59 A female, who appears to be a nurse and a male Corrections Deputy enter the cell. The female appears to conduct a medical examination of STOJCEVSKI.

14:04 The female and Corrections Deputy exit the cell.

16:22 Food was provided and set on the desk by INMATE1. INMATE1 eats some of STOJCEVSKI food.

17:11 INMATE1 was provided with clothing and removed from the cell.

June 22, 2014

STOJCEVSKI stays on the lower bunk all day. No other activity was noted on that day.

June 23, 2014

00:49 STOJCEVSKI stands up and appears to eat some food.

15:48 A female, who appears to be a nurse, and two male Corrections Deputies enter the cell. The female looks at STOJCEVSKI and has him sit up on the bunk and drink from a glass.

15:50 The female and the two Corrections Deputy exit the cell.

17:04 A female, who appears to be a nurse enters the cell and talks to STOJCEVSKI.

17:05 A male Corrections Deputy enters the cell pushing a wheelchair. STOJCEVSKI was put in the wheelchair and taken out of the cell.

17:42 A male inmate (INMATE2) enters the cell followed by STOJCEVSKI in a wheelchair.

20:17 A second male inmate (INMATE3) enters the cell.

June 24, 2014

06:43 Food and a drink was provided.

11:24 Food and drink provided.

13:00 STOJCEVSKI appears to eat some food.

13:17 STOJCEVSKI appears to get into a fight with INMATE3.

13:18 INMATE2 and INMATE3 are removed from the cell.

21:34 A male Corrections Deputy and a female, who appears to be a nurse, enter the cell. The Corrections Deputy fills a glass with water. The two stand and talk and look at STOJCEVSKI.

June 25, 2014

21:45 Two male Corrections Deputies and a female, who appears to be a nurse enter the cell. One of the Corrections Deputies covers up STOJCEVSKI with a blanket. A Corrections Deputy and the female bend over STOJCEVSKI.
21:48 The female and the two Corrections Deputies exit the cell.

June 26, 2014

16:42 A male jail trustee (inmate) enters the cell and puts what appears to be food and drink on the desk.
23:23 A male Corrections Deputy enters the cell. The Corrections Deputy bends over STOJCEVSKI and appears to talk to him.
23:25 The Corrections Deputy exits the cell.

June 27, 2014

16:15 A male jail trustee (inmate) enters the cell and puts what appears to be food and drink on the desk.
17:21 STOJCEVSKI appears to stop moving.
17:23 A male Corrections Deputy enters the cell and appears to check STOJCEVSKI pulse. A second male Corrections Deputy enters the cell and begins CPR on STOJCEVSKI.
17:25 What appear to be several medical personal arrive and begin to treat STOJCEVSKI.
17:35 Appears that EMS arrives to treat STOJCEVSKI.
17:47 Video ends.

Case Summary

The investigation into this matter has been completed and is summarized below. This investigation was initiated based on information received through the media and from the States Attorney's Office. During this investigation, records were collected from the Macomb County Sheriff's Office and Corrective Care Solutions (CCS). A videotape of DANYD STOJCEVSKI's name in the high observation cell in the Macomb County Jail was reviewed. Additionally, records from the Macomb County Jail and CCS were reviewed, a prison medical expert was consulted, interviews of corrections officers, medical staff, and mental health staff at the Macomb County Jail were conducted.

Investigative Summary

On June 14, 2014, DAVID STOJCEVSKI was brought to the Macomb County Jail by the Roseville Police Department. STOJCEVSKI was arrested on a misdemeanor warrant for Obstruction of Justice. STOJCEVSKI appeared before a District Court Judge and was ordered to serve 30 days in the Macomb County Jail or pay a \$772 fine. STOJCEVSKI was also referred by the Judge to Community Corrections for Probation. On June 19, 2014, the Judge amended his order stating that STOJCEVSKI could be released from jail upon enrollment into the Community Corrections M.A.R.C.H. Program.

Upon intake into the Macomb County Jail on June 17, 2014, STOJCEVSKI was asked questions regarding his health. STOJCEVSKI told the medical personnel he was taking medication prescribed by a physician. The nurse TIRFANY DEJICA noted on the intake form that STOJCEVSKI showed obvious physical signs of drug abuse. DEJICA recommended that STOJCEVSKI be placed in the Medical Detox unit.

STOJCZEWSKI was placed in the Detox unit and started on an opiate withdrawal protocol.

Review of Surveillance Video of STOJCZEWSKI's Cell

On June 17, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI was referred to mental health because he was hallucinating and appeared to be talking to people who were not there. STOJCZEWSKI was placed in a mental health cell on suicide watch. This section of the jail has a four video coverage. The video of STOJCZEWSKI from June 17, 2014 until June 27, 2014 was reviewed. The following summarizes observations made from the review.

On June 17, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI entered the cell and was seen one time by what appeared to be three nurses. On June 18, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI was seen on two separate occasions by what appeared to be nurses. During one of the visits, STOJCZEWSKI was provided and drank water. On June 19, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI drank water and appeared to eat some food. On June 20, 2014, on three separate occasions, STOJCZEWSKI was visited by what appeared to be nurses. STOJCZEWSKI appeared to eat some food and drink water twice. On June 21, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI was seen one time by what appeared to be a nurse. On June 23, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI was taken out of the cell for about two hours. Prior to being removed from the cell, STOJCZEWSKI appeared to eat some food and drink water. On June 24, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI was seen by what appeared to be a nurse. STOJCZEWSKI appeared to eat some food and drink water. On June 25, 2014, on one occasion, STOJCZEWSKI was seen by what appeared to be a nurse. On June 27, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI stopped moving and a corrections deputy entered the cell and appeared to radio for help. A second corrections deputy entered the cell and began CPR.

An FD-302 detailing the review of the video is attached.

Review of CCS Medical Reports

The Macomb County Sheriff's Office contracted with CCS to provide medical and mental healthcare to the jail inmate population. The Macomb County Sheriff's Office and CCS provided the medical records for STOJCZEWSKI. The following is a brief review of STOJCZEWSKI's medical reports by CCS:

On June 11, 2014, STOJCZEWSKI was interviewed by TERRYAN DELUCA upon intake into the Macomb County Jail. On the receiving screening form, STOJCZEWSKI indicated he was being treated for chronic pain. STOJCZEWSKI also told DELUCA he was taking 20mg of methadone. DELUCA noted that STOJCZEWSKI had an abrasion to his left elbow. STOJCZEWSKI's blood pressure was 120/84 and his weight was 195 pounds. STOJCZEWSKI

was placed on the opiate withdrawal protocol or COMS. STOJCEVSKI was placed in the detox section of the jail and prescribed 25mg meprobamate, 325mg acetaminophen, 2mg lorazepam. On June 15, 2014, a medical note was placed in STOJCEVSKI's file and stated that detox was complete.

On June 17, 2014, at 7:15 am, Nurse MICAL BRY-SHELLEY responded to a call for medical assistance. BRY-SHELLEY reported STOJCEVSKI was in bed twitching his eyes when she arrived. BRY-SHELLEY put an ammonia inhaler under STOJCEVSKI's nose, which caused STOJCEVSKI to sit up and stare at the medical staff. STOJCEVSKI was put in a wheelchair and taken to the medical office to be seen by the doctor. STOJCEVSKI was seen by the doctor and BRY-SHELLEY reported STOJCEVSKI verbalized understanding and was able to stand and walk back to his unit with a steady gait.

STOJCEVSKI was seen by Dr. LAWRENCE SHERMAN on June 17, 2014. However, the medical note indicated STOJCEVSKI was seen on June 23, 2014, and was not entered until June 24, 2014. Dr. SHERMAN indicated in his interview he saw STOJCEVSKI on June 17, 2014. The medical note written by Dr. SHERMAN indicated that he observed STOJCEVSKI fluttering his eyes. Dr. SHERMAN stated in the note this was not a seizure and was most likely a poor attempt to feign one, by STOJCEVSKI. Dr. SHERMAN indicated in the note that he shook STOJCEVSKI's shoulder and told him to sit up, at which point STOJCEVSKI stopped fluttering his eyes and said, "What's happening?" Dr. SHERMAN recommended STOJCEVSKI be returned to the jail without seizure precautions.

On June 17, 2014, at 4:19:25, Nurse VICKY BERRMAN responded to a medical call for STOJCEVSKI. BERRMAN noted that STOJCEVSKI was sitting on the floor and stated all his organs, but 10% of his heart, was removed and his arms shredded a couple days ago. STOJCEVSKI said it happened while he was in the jail. STOJCEVSKI also told BERRMAN he had been taking any or kanax daily for anxiety and oxycodone for pain. BERRMAN took STOJCEVSKI's vital signs with his blood pressure at 150/98. BERRMAN notes on her report that STOJCEVSKI denied any mental health medications or diagnoses at time of intake and also denied any vdrug/STOH usage. BERRMAN said in the note that STOJCEVSKI was housed in mental health in high observation and she told STOJCEVSKI to let corrections/medical staff know if his symptoms worsen.

On June 18, 2014, STOJCEVSKI was seen by MONICA CUNNY. CUNNY stated in her note she was requested to see STOJCEVSKI by the mental health staff. CUNNY reported that STOJCEVSKI was lying on his bunk with his eyes closed and when she approached him, he began to flutter his eyes. CUNNY took his vital signs with a blood pressure of 138/88. CUNNY said STOJCEVSKI denied taking any mental health drugs, but was taking klonopin for anxiety and last took them two weeks earlier. STOJCEVSKI first told CUNNY that he was prescribed the klonopin, but was unable to name the pharmacy or location of the pharmacy where he

got the drugs. CHENY provided STOJCEVSKI with water and had him drink two 6 oz cups. CHENY indicated she had discussed STOJCEVSKI with Dr. SHERMAN and no new orders were received.

On June 27, 2014, a report was written by JACLYN LUBAWSKI and by REV. SHEILEY. STOJCEVSKI was unresponsive; CPR was initiated, EMS was called, and STOJCEVSKI was taken to the hospital.

Attached are copies of the medical reports provided by CCS.

Review of CCS Mental Health Reports

A review of the mental health records showed on June 17, 2014, a Macomb County Sheriff's Office referral to Mental Health Form for STOJCEVSKI. Noted on the form was Per Danielle from MH place in green. Noted in the comments section was the statement

"Maintaining talking to pot that are not there and also stated that he died earlier today". The referral was made by CAMPAU on June 17, 2014.

On June 18, 2014, STOJCEVSKI was seen by CHANNYLIN BROCK. BROCK noted in her report that STOJCEVSKI was placed in high observation watch on June 17, due to hallucinating and bizarre behavior. BROCK said that STOJCEVSKI was lying on the floor drunk with rapid eye movement and refused to engage with her. BROCK stated STOJCEVSKI had not acted out self injuriously within the facility and should remain on watch. BROCK noted that the mental health staff would attempt to complete an initial mental health evaluation the next day.

On June 19, 2014, at 10:45 am, STOJCEVSKI was seen by DANIELLE NELSON. NELSON stated in her report STOJCEVSKI was placed in high observation due to hallucinating and bizarre behavior. NELSON observed STOJCEVSKI lying on the floor naked with one arm half in the air and rapid eye movements. NELSON noted STOJCEVSKI refused to engage and should remain in high observation.

On June 20, 2014, at 9:50 am, STOJCEVSKI was seen by NELSON. NELSON noted that STOJCEVSKI refused to engage with her but had not acted out self injuriously within the facility and should remain in high observation.

On June 21, 2014, at 9:35 am, STOJCEVSKI was seen by BROCK. BROCK reported that STOJCEVSKI was lying on the floor naked with rapid eye movements. BROCK noted that the mental health staff had received information that STOJCEVSKI had engaged with the medical staff and thus the mental health staff suspected STOJCEVSKI was exaggerating his symptoms for secondary gain. BROCK said STOJCEVSKI asked her if he would be receiving any medication and after learning that no medication had been ordered for him, he ended contact and refused to engage with BROCK. BROCK recommended STOJCEVSKI remain in high observation.

On June 24, 2014, a Mental Health Treatment Plan was drafted by BROCK. In the plan, BROCK states STOJCHEVSKI was placed in high observation watch due to hallucinating and bizarre behavior. STOJCHEVSKI was observed lying on the floor naked with rapid eye movement. STOJCHEVSKI had fully engaged with the nursing staff and the mental health staff suspected that STOJCHEVSKI was exaggerating his symptoms for secondary gain. The plan notes that STOJCHEVSKI should remain on watch until he had fully engaged with the mental health staff. The goal of the plan was a) to decrease risk level of all forms of behavior leading to self harm, and b) the ability to develop and discuss with mental health staff a plan to maintain adequate psychological functioning if returned to a lesser monitored/general population setting.

On June 22, 2014, at 9:15 am, STOJCHEVSKI was seen by BROCK. BROCK noted STOJCHEVSKI was lying on the lower bunk naked and said the mental health staff suspected STOJCHEVSKI of exaggerating his symptoms for secondary gain. BROCK recommended STOJCHEVSKI remain in high observation.

On June 23, 2014, at 11:00 am, STOJCHEVSKI was seen by NELSON. NELSON noted STOJCHEVSKI was lying on the lower bunk naked and said the mental health staff suspected STOJCHEVSKI of exaggerating his symptoms for secondary gain. BROCK recommended STOJCHEVSKI remain in high observation.

On June 24, 2014, at 10:50 am, STOJCHEVSKI was seen by BROCK. BROCK noted STOJCHEVSKI was lying on the lower bunk naked and said the mental health staff suspected STOJCHEVSKI of exaggerating his symptoms for secondary gain. BROCK recommended STOJCHEVSKI remain in high observation.

On June 25, 2014, at 2:45 pm, STOJCHEVSKI was seen by KELLY MANN. MANN said that STOJCHEVSKI was lying on the floor of the cell, naked and uncovered. STOJCHEVSKI refused to cover himself and would not engage with MANN. MANN recommended STOJCHEVSKI remain in high observation.

On June 26, 2014, at 1:50 pm, STOJCHEVSKI was seen by NELSON. NELSON noted the STOJCHEVSKI was lying on the floor partially covered and mildly shaking with his eyes fluttering. NELSON said that STOJCHEVSKI refused to engage with her and recommended STOJCHEVSKI remain in high observation.

On June 27, 2014, at 10:40 am, STOJCHEVSKI was seen by BROCK. BROCK observed STOJCHEVSKI was lying on the floor under the bunk and his eyes were fluttering. BROCK recommended STOJCHEVSKI remain in high observation.

June 19, 2014 8:45 STODCHVSKI MH1. Medical advised of STODCHVSKI

Medical Examiner's Report

Dr. GRIFFINGER advised the jail never checked to determine if STOJEVSKI was in a methadone program and if he was prescribed methadone. Dr. GRIFFINGER said based on the amount of methadone STOJEVSKI admitted he was taking, he did not appear to be on a methadone maintenance program and may have been buying the drug on the street.

Dr. GRIFFINGER stated if this was a civil proceeding, he would say that STOJEVSKI died because of deliberate indifference to his medical needs by the staff at the jail. STOJEVSKI had all the signs and symptoms of benzodiazepine withdrawal and was not treated. The jail had policies and protocols in place to handle this type of situation and the policies were not followed. Dr. GRIFFINGER said this was a preventable death.
