Pipp Gillette Camp St. Cafe & Store 215 S. 3rd (Camp St.)

Pipp Gillette raises cattle on the family ranch near Lovelady, Texas, where his grandfather started in 1912.

His Camp Street Cafe in Crockett, Texas, is a live music venue featuring performers from around the world.

Pipp plays traditional cowboy music on guitar, banjo, harmonica, and bones.

Pipp and his late brother Guy Gillette recorded eight albums of cowboy music and were recipients of the Western Heritage Wrangler Award for Best Traditional Album of 2010.

They also received the 2012 Wrangler Award for Best Outstanding Original Western Composition for their performance of the song, *Trade Off,* penned by Waddie Mitchell

Pipp recently performed at the 2014 National Story Tellers Festival in Jonesborough Tennessee.

Since taking over the running of the family ranch in 1983, the Gillette Brothers, Guy & Pipp, have found that diversification is not only a necessity, it keeps things interesting. Their involvement in the cattle business as well as the music business - both as performers and music venue operators - proves challenging. The revitalization of cowboy music and poetry in recent years allowed the brothers to combine their life long interest in the history of the west and its music with their musical experience. They have recorded and released eight albums of traditional cowboy music interspersed with a few originals.

They have played at major events and venues around the country including: The 2008 Smithsonian Folklife Festival in Washington DC, The National Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko, NV, The Monterey Cowboy Poetry & Music Festival in Monterey, CA, The Santa Clarita Cowboy Poetry & Music Festival in Santa Clarita, CA, The Willow Tree Festival in Gordon, NE, The Arizona Cowboy Poets Gathering in Prescott, AZ; The Cherry Blossom Festival in Macon, GA; The National Arboretum in Washington, DC, The Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody, WY, and The National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City, OK, The Museum of South Texas in Edinburgh Texas.

Guy and Pipp Gillette and Waddie Mitchell received theWrangler Award for "Best Original Composition of 2012" for Waddie's song "Trade off". From the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City, OK.

In August 2005, the Gillette Brothers traveled to Japan representing the State of Texas at the World Expo - Aichi/Nagoya, performing their music at the US Pavilion.

They were awarded the 2003 and the 1998 Will Rogers Award for Outstanding Achievement in the Advancement of Contemporary Cowboy Music Best Duo/Group by The Academy of Western Artists.

The Gillette Brothers have been profiled with feature articles in: Texas Highways, Texas Monthly, the Dallas Morning

News, Southern Living and the Houston Chronicle.

They have appeared on television shows: Texas Country Reporter, Good Morning Texas, and CMT's Christmas Special "Christmas In Cowboy Country", hosted by Clint Black.

Their music appears on the soundtrack to the documentary film, Gathering Remnants.

They have demonstrated chuckwagon cooking at the Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City; the Ranching Heritage Museum in Lubbock , Texas; The Museum of South Texas in Edinburgh Texas; Dalton Days in Longview, Texas ; and the Cherry Blossom Festival in Macon , Georgia . Their cooking has been spotlighted in Persimmon Hill, the magazine of the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum ; The National Cowboy Hall of Fame Cookbook by B. Byron Price; A Taste of Texas Ranching by Tom Bryant and Joel Bernstein; and the Spirit of the West: Cooking for Ranch House & Range by Beverly Cox and Martin Jacobs.

They have also received the National Cowboy Symposium's American Cowboy Culture Chuck Wagon Award.
