Alvin Ailey and the Dance Theatre of Harlem commissioned his ballet scores. However, Perkinson's deepest desire was to become a composer and conductor of classical music. At age 23, his first string quartet was played in Carnegie Hall, and a decade later Perkinson co-founded the country's first fully integrated orchestra – Symphony of the New World. This biography highlights his personal life, his diverse compositions and the orchestra he helped found.

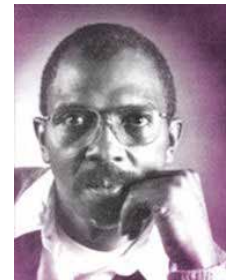
New Letters on the Air:

U.P. 200

Friday, February 16 - Sunday, February 18
Start: Downtown Marquette, 7pm Friday

The UP200 is one of the top 12-dog mid-distance races in the Midwest, as well as being an Iditarod qualifier. The UP200 trail covers 230 miles of challenging terrain from Marquette to Grand Marais, Michigan and back again through forested land and near-wilderness. Mushers face hills, creek crossings, deep snow, and isolated trail. This is a true test of skill and stamina!

Midnight Run

Start: Downtown Marquette, 8:30pm Friday

The Midnight Run is an eight-dog, 90 mile race. This race is typically a faster race than the UP200. Midnight Run mushers will again start in downtown Marquette traveling to Chatham and then returning to Marquette for the finish. The Midnight Run draws some of the finest eight-dog teams in the region and the competition is fierce! Starts approximately 30 minutes after the last UP200 musher has left the chute, but not before 8:30 pm.

Jack Pine 30

Starts Saturday, February 18 at 10am

The Jack Pine 30 is a 26-mile race for 6-dog teams that starts and finishes in Gwinn, with the traditional start at Larry's Family Foods, and the finish line at the First Baptist Church of Gwinn, located on North Billings Street.

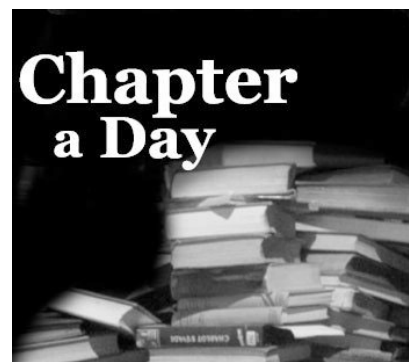

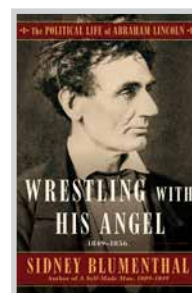
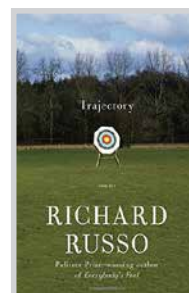
