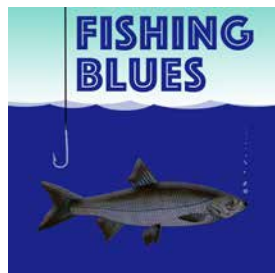

The Hiawatha Music Co-op Celebrates Its 40th Traditional Music Festival

Friday-Sunday, July 20-22



Join in the fun at a weekend of traditional music at the lovely Tourist Park campground in Marquette. This is a family oriented, music filled weekend on the beautiful shores of the Dead River Basin. There are music events and activities for every age.

Each July, since 1984, the Hiawatha Music Co-op has invited musicians, families and guests

from near and far to come to Tourist Park for a weekend of traditional music and arts, concerts, workshops and informal jam sessions. They call this the Hiawatha Traditional Music Festival. In the past thirty nine years, families have grown, children have grown, babies have come and now one will find many campsites with 3 and even 4 generations of family members, passing on the love of American traditional music. This is the mission of HMC: To promote, provide, educate, and inform the public and encourage participation in traditional forms of music, dance, and arts. Over the past 40 years, HMC has brought nearly 5,000 performers from all around the world and country to the Festival.



All Strings Considered

This year's music promises to once again please everyone with local, regional, national musicians and world traveling musicians. The main stage on Saturday and Sunday will feature the music from a variety of traditional music performers. (See line-up on page 14.)

Things I Hope to See on Our Imperial Cities Tour

Our Imperial Cities tour is chocked full of amazing things to explore, yet there is so much more. Below are some things you might want to check out during your free time in these awesome cities.

The John Lennon Graffiti Wall, Prague.

Since 1980, it's been repainted numerous times and is laced in graffiti lyrics from Lennon and The Beatles.



Prague's famous Dancing House inspired by Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers.

Designed in collaboration with Canadian-American Frank Gehry and Croatian-Czech Vlado Milunic, the building symbolises yin and yang. In this case, the blending of communism and democracy.

The Zizkov Tower, Prague.

Often voted Prague's most hated landmark, the Zizkov Tower has statues of climbing babies on it. Czech artist David Cerny is about as controversial as it gets – his specialty is combining the thought-provoking with the utterly bizarre, after all.



The Petřín Lookout Tower, Prague.

You can actually climb the 299 stairs of The Petřín Lookout Tower to get an incredible view of the city!

The Original Vienna Snow Globe Shop.

In 1900, Erwin Perzy, a fine instruments mechanic, was trying to improve the brightness of lightbulbs for a surgical lamp. But instead, he accidentally invented a snow globe. This first snow globe featured The Basilica of Mariazell, and was the catalyst for Perzy and his brother to open The Original Vienna Snow Globe shop. Over 100 years later, they are still making traditional snow globes right in Vienna, all hand painted and manually assembled.



The Vienna Zoo or Tiergarten Schonbrunn.


The Vienna Zoo is the worlds' largest, oldest and only baroque zoo, built in the gardens of Schonbrunn Palace in 1752. Tiergarten

Schönbrunn boasts over 700 different animal species and was voted the best zoo in Europe. Plus, with its original baroque architecture, it is also considered the world's most beautiful zoo.



The Vienna Giant Wheel, or Wiener Riesenrad. The Giant Wheel was built in 1897 to honor the

Golden Jubilee of Emperor Franz Josef I. A year later, in a protest intended to draw attention to the city's poor, a woman hung herself outside one of the cabins. By 1916, a demolition permit was issued, but there wasn't enough money to actually destroy it. In 1944, it was burned down, rebuilt the next year, and put back in rotation in 1947.

Hospital in the Rock Nuclear Bunker Museum, Budapest.

Part of an approximately 6-mile (10k) stretch of interconnected caves and cellars beneath Buda Castle Hill, Sziklakórház Atombunker Múzeum is dedicated to a former secret emergency hospital and nuclear bunker.



The Danube Island, a Recreational Paradise in Vienna.

The 21k-long Danube Island was originally created to reinforce Vienna's flood protection system. It is the favorite recreational region of the Viennese and can be reached from the city center in just a few minutes via the subway lines. There is an expansive network of trails,

bathing areas with flat beaches as well as natural bathing sites, a water slide, tennis courts, beach volleyball, a surfing school, a climbing park, a water ski lift and



the worlds' biggest trampoline center, offering plenty of opportunities for fun on and in the water. A variety of



bars and restaurants completes the range of leisure facilities.

Thermal Springs, Budapest. Budapest has more thermal springs than any other capital city in the world. An amazing 70 million liters of thermal waters rise to the surface daily. The hot springs



have given birth to dozens of medicinal baths and to a bathing culture dating back to Roman times.

The Statue of Anonymous in Budapest's City Park. Legend has it that touching the pen of the statue of Anonymous in Buda-



pest's City Park will bless you with great writing abilities. You may not believe it, but the shiny surface of the pen suggests that many still do.

The Labyrinthine 'Underground Flower Garden' Caves Beneath Budapest. Beneath the city of Budapest lies a hidden subterranean world

that reveals an unknown chapter of the city's famous spa culture. With over 80 geothermal



springs and around 200 caves found to date, Budapest is home to the world's largest known thermal cave system. While most are familiar with the city's steaming thermal baths, some of which date back as far as the Ottoman occupation in the 15th century, the source of Budapest's thermal waters is a curiosity in itself.
