Pine Mountain Music Festival 2018 Season

The 2018 festival takes place June 15 through June 30 in Houghton, Calumet, Crystal Falls, Marquette, Kingsford, and Iron Mountain. Events are described below and dates and locations are in the event grid on page 7.

Bizet's Carmen

This season's pièce de résistance is Bizet's sensuous opera, *Carmen*, which is the 37th opera produced by PMMF. Amanda Crider, a brilliant singer and multifaceted artist, plays the role of Carmen. Many will recognize the return of tenor Isaac Hurtado (*Ultimi: Three Tenors*) as Don José and soprano Heather Youngquist (Resident Opera Artist, *Rockland The Opera*) as Micaëla. Baritone Christopher Holmes (*Escamillo*) rounds out a rock-solid lead cast. The orchestra and chorus include professional musicians from the Upper Peninsula and surrounding areas. Keweenaw Symphony Orchestra music director, Joel Neves, conducts the opera.



Bergonzi String Quartet

The Bergonzi String Quartet returns for its 24th residency at the Pine Mountain Music Festival for the 2018 season. The newest iteration of the festival's *Permanent Quartet-in-Residence* comprises Scott Flavin (first violin), Karen Lord-Powell (second violin), Laura Wilcox (viola), and Ross Harbaugh (cello). Their 2018 repertoire includes Divertimento No. 3, K. 138 (Mozart), Quartet, Op. 11 (Barber), and Quartet in C Minor (Brahms). The quartet continues its special tradition of presenting free children's concerts which will take place at Portage Lake District Library (Houghton, Saturday, June 23 at 2pm); Dickinson County Library (Iron Mountain, Thursday, June 21 at 2pm); and Marquette Regional History Center (Marquette, Wednesday, June 20 at 2pm.)



UPstarts

The inspiring UPstarts concert series, now in its 6th year, features talented young musicians from the Upper Peninsula. Winning participants are selected from a peninsula-wide UPstarts Talent Contest that mines the best talent in the region. The 2018 winners are Elizabeth Grugin, Cheyenne Kaufman, Irene Ra, and Isabel Valencia. Susie Byykkonen, the festival's staff accompanist, accompanies the group.

Art Songs Recital: Music of Schumann

Justin Spenner and Mario Perez – creators of the innovative B-Sides Art Song Collective – present a one-night-only vocal recital of the sublime art songs of German Romantic composer, Robert Schumann, including *Dichterliebe* (A Poet's Love) and *Liederkreis* (Round of Songs). Leslie Dukes accompanies.

Alma Flamenco with Karyne Arys

In a continuing effort to diversify our programming, the Festival introduces award-winning French dancer, Karyne Arys, as our featured Flamenco artist, joined by Paul Buttin (guitar) and Kahlil Sabbagh (cajon). She is also cast as the gypsy dancer in *Carmen*.

Foods You Gotta Try When Visiting Prague, Vienna & Budapest

When I travel one of my favorite things to do is experience the local cuisine, which is what I'm most looking forward to on our tour of Prague, Vienna and Budapest.

I've been doing lots of research about the traditional foods of these countries and I can't wait to start eating my way across each country. (You would never guess that I have a sweet tooth.) – *Evelyn Massaro*

In Prague:

Trdelník, or chimney cakes, are made of rolled yeast dough that is wrapped around a stick and roasted over an open flame until golden brown and crispy on the outside, and tender and gooey in the middle.



The hot dough is then brushed with butter and rolled around in a cinnamon-sugar and nut mixture. You can also get different flavors spread inside such as Nutella or melted chocolate.

Knedlíky are dumplings served along with a meat dish or other oft-eaten mains, such as gulás. This versatile dish serves well as a dessert when prepared with sweet fillings such as fruit or jam.



Grilované klobásy, consists of grilled sausages tucked into a roll and served with a variety of tasty sauces. You will easily find stalls selling this item in Wenceslas Square and the vicinity of Old Town Square.



In Vienna:

Palatschinken – As opposed to Kaiserschmarrn, which is very thick pancakes, Palatschinken are thin like crepes. They're served up hot, and with a thin filling of sweet fruit jelly or chocolate.



Geröstete Knödel mit Ei – It's breakfast for dinner! Kinda. Geröstete Knödel mit Ei translates to roasted dumplings with egg, and that's essentially what it is, albeit with parsley and onion added to the mix.

Imagine making a savory omelet, chopping it up, and serving it for dinner with a nice salad.



Esterházy Torte – Invented in Budapest and named for a prince and diplomat of



the Austrian Empire. but quickly appropriated by Viennese cafe culture, the Torte consists of buttercream spiced with cognac or vanilla, sandwiched between four to five layers of almond meringue (macaroon) dough. The torte is iced with a fondant glaze and decorated with a characteristic chocolate striped pattern.

In Budapest:

Túrógombóc – Curd or cottage cheese dumplings in the shape of balls, boiled in water then covered with buttery bread crumbs and served with warm, sweetened sour-cream sauce.



Pörkölt – Completely different from goulash Pörkölt is boneless meat, stewed with paprika, vegetables but without potatoes. The meat can vary from beef, lamb, chicken and pork.



Rántott Sajt – Deep...fried...cheese. YUM! Rántott Sajt are flat cheese croquette, cheese rolled in bread-crumbs and, deep fried. Very addictive.

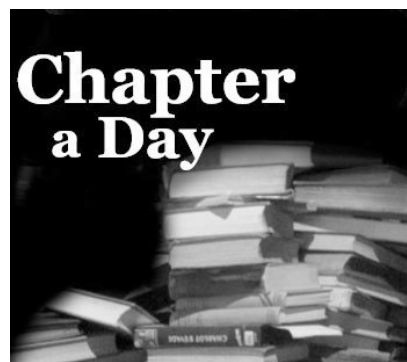
