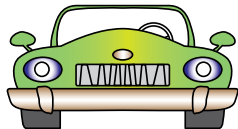

Protect My Public Media Update

After returning from summer recess, both the House and Senate passed a continuing resolution (CR), a short-term funding mechanism, which will keep the government – and all public broadcasting programs – funded at the same level through December 8, 2017.

Even with the approval of the short-term CR, the Senate and House are continuing their work to adopt funding levels for the federal government for when the temporary measure expires in December. We will communicate more about these activities as we learn about them. For now, here's a summary of the process:

Senate Action: The Senate Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies (Labor-HHS-Ed) Bill was approved by the Subcommittee and full Appropriations Committee, and it included full funding for all public broadcasting accounts:

- \$445 million for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB) in FY 2020
- \$27.7 million for Ready To Learn
- \$20 million for an Interconnection and Infrastructure program

House Action: On September 14, 2017, the House passed the “omnibus” consolidated appropriations bill, which includes full funding for CPB and Ready To Learn. No funding for Interconnection was provided.

With the CR in place, at this point, the continued deliberation of the omnibus bill is largely a symbolic expression of the House's funding priorities.

Our Assessment: The Senate's recommendations put public media funding in a good position moving into negotiations at the end of the year. We will continue to monitor the process and will update you as we learn more.

A huge part of our success is due to the efforts of Protect My Public Media's grassroots network. In the first week of September alone, over 15,000 emails, tweets and Facebook messages were sent to lawmakers in support of full funding. Thank you!

More than half of all Americans use public media every month. 170 million Americans connect through 368 public television stations, 934 public radio stations, hundreds of online services, and in-person events and activities.

Public broadcasting is one of the most effective public/private partnerships in America. Annual federal funding amounts to only \$1.35 per American and is leveraged by local stations to raise six times that amount from other sources.

Public broadcasting supports lifelong learning for all Americans. Investments in children's educational, cultural, public affairs and news programming, digital classroom resources, teacher training, and distance learning have made public broadcasting a leader in lifelong learning.

Public broadcasting strengthens our democracy. The free flow of ideas and debate helps us participate in the political process as informed citizens.

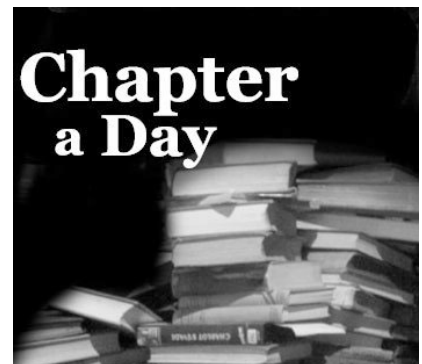

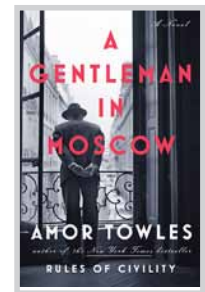
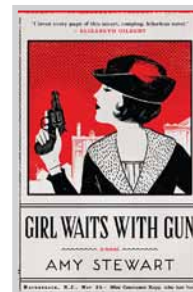
