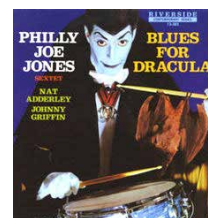

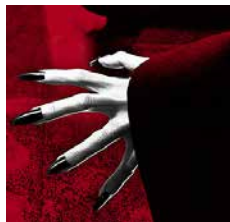

WNMU Says Goodbye to Marian McPartland's Piano Jazz, and Hello to Afterglow

Five years after the death of its host and namesake, *Marian McPartland's Piano Jazz* is ending distribution to the nation's public radio stations.

Jazz pianist Marian McPartland gave the world a unique jazz program that paired conversation and duet improvisational performances, and reached an audience of millions, connecting with jazz fans and the curious alike. She interviewed practically every major jazz musician of the post-WWII era.

On Public Radio 90, *Piano Jazz* will be replaced by Vocal Jazz in the form of the long-running WFIU (Indiana Public Media) series *Afterglow*.

Hosted by Mark Chilla, *Afterglow* presents vocal jazz and popular song from the Great American Songbook. Each week, Mark highlights the greatest singers and songs in vocal jazz and popular song from the 1930s to today. Whether it's the unlikely friendship between Frank Sinatra and songwriter Jimmy Van Heusen, the times trumpeter Clifford Brown worked with vocalists, or songs all about love, *Afterglow* tells the stories of America's songs.

Appropriately, *Afterglow* takes its name from a composition by Marian McPartland called "In the Days of Our Love," although it used to have a different title before Peggy Lee added lyrics to it. The title of the original instrumental tune was "Afterglow."

The theme music you will hear each week at the beginning of *Afterglow* is the 1933 Will Hudson, Irving Mills, and Eddie DeLange tune "Moonglow," performed by Oscar Peterson on the 1956 Verve album *Pastel Moods*.

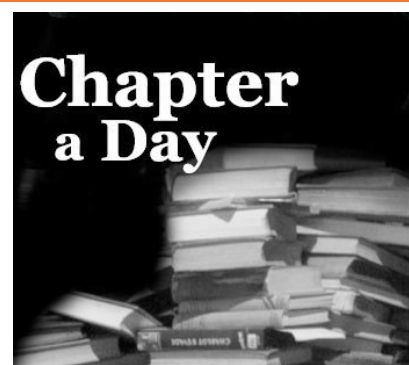

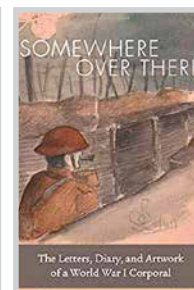
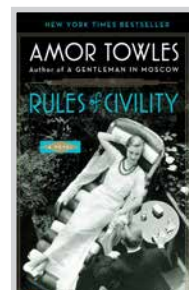

In different eras of European history, these factors brought forth ingenious pieces of music, such as by Bartók and Haydn. "Europe in unity and diversity" percolates at this concert from the festival Heidelberg Spring.
