# 2018 1st Quarter Issues Report for Wyoming Public Media

**Issue: Politics** 

**Topic:** The debate over tax reform has finally come to an end. Congress has passed its bill and President Trump has signed it. But what's it all mean for western energy? Wyoming Public Radio's Cooper McKim helps deconstruct tax reform's impact on Wyoming.

Topic: President Donald Trump has used the term "clean coal" a lot lately, often when talking about bringing back the coal industry. But what does he actually mean when he says clean coal? In truth, it can mean a lot of different things. Without it, the industry faces a long, slow decline. In some places that really depend on coal, this concept of clean coal is really looked at as a holy grail. Madelyn Beck explains.

## **Issue: Native American issues**

Topic: Starting in 2006 - the state granted permission to a couple of tribes to hunt on federal public lands near Yellowstone National Park. This was due to a treaty that was agreed upon in 1855 that includes tribes from the Pacific Northwest. The Yakama Nation is the first tribe from Washington state to join in on the hunt. Those tribal members drew tags and recently travelled to Yellowstone to exercise their right to hunt buffalo on public land for the first time. Wyoming Public Radio's Kamila Kudelska joined in.

Topic: After years of going without one, the University of Wyoming has hired a new Native American Program Director. Wyoming Public Radio's Melodie Edwards sat down with Reinette Tendore to hear her own personal story of struggle as a student at UW.

Topic: Last year the governor set up the Economically Needed Diversity Options for Wyoming Council...better known as ENDOW. After a few months of touring the state and meetings, ENDOW has developed a list of recommendations to start setting the stage for diversifying the economy. Greg Hill is the Chairman of Endow and he explains why ENDOW is different from past economic development efforts.

## **Issue: Education**

Topic: The "Forever GI Bill" -- one of the bipartisan triumphs of 2017 significantly changes education benefits for service members and veterans. It eliminates a requirement that veterans use their benefits within 15-years of active-duty service. But as Wyoming Public Radio's education reporter Tennessee Watson discovers, supporting veterans in higher education is more complicated than just giving them more time.

Wyoming Public Radio's education reporter Tennessee Watson spoke with Rose Martinelli, senior director with Huron Consulting, who's been working with UW's administration to help the university grow

Topic: 10 months and \$800,000 later, the Select Committee on School Finance Recalibration has completed its in-depth look at how Wyoming finances education. Consultants told lawmakers the current school funding model *works*, but pointed out areas for improvement. And their upgrades came with a cost. But despite that recommendation to spend more, lawmakers are opting to spend less. Wyoming Public Radio's education reporter Tennessee Watson follows up.

#### Issue: Wildlife

Topic: With grizzly bears off of the endangered species list, many scientists view grizzlies as a success story. But the question remains, how does the bear successfully return to a heavily populated environment? Wyoming Public Radio's Kamila Kudelska looks at the history of grizzly management to possibly learn some lessons for how to handle grizzlies in the future.

So - if these routes are blocked it would stop these animals ability to recover after a winter season. Wyoming Public Radio's Kamila Kudelska has more.

Topic: Since the beginning of this year, there have been four criminal acts at the Stephen's Creek Facility in Yellowstone National Park. Wyoming Public Radio's Kamila Kudelska reports.

Topic: Turns out winter for those little fawns wasn't so bad. The smaller herd size meant deer had more to eat last summer, so they got fat and healthy. ## **Issue: Social issues**

Topic: Most states have laws, or pending legislation, requiring that public schools teach sexual violence prevention. That leaves Wyoming as one of the few states with absolutely nothing on

the books. But the Wyoming Sexual Violence Prevention Council is working to fill this gap by supporting a growing network of local projects. Among them is a program that works with student athletes. Wyoming Public Radio's education reporter Tennessee Watson interviewed Bob Vines -- the Washakie County Victim/Witness Coordinator -- to find out more.

As Wyoming Public Radio's Melodie Edwards reports for her series "I Respectfully Disagree," that's when students decided to host a public debate over THAT question.

Topic: Jennet Nedirmammedova is a senior at the University of Wyoming. invited me into Her apartment, a couple of blocks from campus. It, is cozy – a couple of rooms with paintings on every wall. She cooks was cooking pasta, and offers me some as we sit down at a wooden table edging her kitchen and the stairway. Nedirmammedova came to Wyoming from Turkmenistan to study environmental science, and she has since added a second major in religious studies, plus two minors. She also works two jobs.

One of those students recently filed a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education Office for Civil Rights, asking the federal government to investigate UW and its Army ROTC program. Topic: The country's debate over immigration is escalating, and now it's arrived in Wyoming. This was met with great celebration by many local folks like Uinta County Commissioner Craig Welling. To him, it means jobs.

## **Issue: Environment**

Topic: When you look at the Medicine Bow National Forest in southern Wyoming, you see patches of brown – casualties of bark beetles –bugs that kill trees. Even though it's been over five years since the epidemic peaked, the forest is still full of these dead trees. The Forest Service has created a proposal to help "clean up" up these areas more efficiently. But as Wyoming Public Radio's Alanna Elder reports, not everyone agrees on how to do that.

She tells me that the doctor shortage is a concern.
