During this six-month reporting period, International Public Affairs Consultants, Inc. engaged in various activities on behalf of the Embassy of South Africa, including the following:

Attended the annual Heads of Mission Meeting at the Embassy and talked with each of the Consuls General regarding projects that we are involved with on behalf of South Africa and especially for the benefit of black South Africans.

For example, talked with Consul General Paul Coetzee about several of the black American businessmen with whom he has had contact. A couple of them had recently visited South Africa and had communicated to us that their trip was going well and was proving to be very fruitful. We promised to get them involved with the Resolve Through Commerce Foundation, which has no formal relationship with either the United States nor South African Government.

Talked with Consul General Dan Smith about a compressor manufacturer located in his area with whom we have been working to have their products exported to South Africa. products would be finished and distributed there by a black South African company.

Also during the Heads of Mission meeting, talked with Mr. Fred Conradie, Head of the North America Section of the Department of Foreign Affairs, about our proposals to send the largest possible number of black American academics, clergymen, businessmen and community leaders to visit South Africa and see that country first hand.

Drafted and delivered a memorandum to the Ambassador regarding this same proposal to sponsor as many trips as possible for influential black Americans to visit South Africa.

Met with Mr. Maurice Starks, a local black businessman who expressed interest in doing business in South Africa. He has done business in other countries in Africa and would like to get involved in the fishing business in South Africa.  $\mathbb{S}$ 

We recommended that Mr. Starks meet with Mr. Arnold Mentz. Economics Minister. 号

Met with a group of black businessmen in Washington about published accounts of Revlon's intention to sell its company in South Africa.

Arranged a conversation between a representative of this group of businessmen and a representative of Revlon about the proposed sale.

Talked with officers of the American Home Products Corporation about the potential sale of their two main facilities in South Africa, Ayerst Laboratories and Wyeth Laboratories.

Prepared for and hosted a dinner in honor of Ambassador Koornhof. The purpose of the dinner was to give the Ambassador an opportunity to meet with several prominent black Americans who have great interest in South Africa.

The guests in attendance included Assistant Secretary of State Alan Lee Keyes; U. S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commissioner Clarence Thomas; and U. S. Minority Business Development Agency Deputy Director Theron Bell. Also in attendance were Mr. Jim Denson, a businessman who had recently returned from a trip to South Africa, where he had appointments with the Deciduous Fruit Board, the KWV Winery, and several other businesses; and others.

Met with businessman Junius Hayes, president of Haytex International Corporation, about his involvement in a meeting of the Resolve Through Commerce Foundation, which was convened on June 30 by former Ambassador-designate Robert Brown.

Also arranged appointments for Mr. Hayes with Mr. Cyril Hyde, Science Counselor at the Embassy, to discuss the application of his scientific products in South Africa, and with Mr. Arnold Mentz, Economics Counselor, regarding their marketability.

Talked with Mr. Earl Anderson about the possibility of his company, Madison Madison International, doing construction and development business in South Africa. Introduced Mr. Anderson to Counselor Mentz.

Talked with Mr. Wendell Gunn, former Assistant Treasurer of Pepsico, Inc. and former Special Assistant to President Reagan for Commerce and Trade, regarding Pepsico's interest in selling its Kentucky Fried Chicken stores in South Africa.

At the time, Pepsico was completing its consideration of the sale. Mr. Gunn expected that following a report of the Capitol Expenditure Committee, we would be able to introduce a group of black American businessmen to the appropriate Pepsico officers to begin negotiations for the purchase of the company in conjunction with a group of black South African investors.

There are 100 company-owned Kentucky Fried Chicken stores and 56 franchises throughout South Africa.

Met with Mr. Bruce Rikerson of the U. S. State Department to discuss his current activities in regard to the South Africa issue.

Met with <u>Washington Inquirer</u> columnist Allan Brownfeld about pieces that he has written. Also encouraged him to write a column about Assistant Secretary of State Alan Lee Keyes' arguments about the destructive effects of sanctions on the lives of black South Africans.


Met with Mr. Jim Roberts, head of Radio America, a nationwide radio commentary and point/counterpoint syndicate, about more objective pieces about South Africa.

Worked with Mrs. Mag Gottleib of the American Legislative Exchange Council to review the legislation pending in the various state legislatures.

Provided information about state legislative activities to the Embassy and discussed the same with several of the Consuls General.

Hosted a luncheon meeting for the Ambassador to meet with Congressman Richard Baker and Congressman Clyde Holloway of Louisiana to discuss the South Africa issue generally and also to discuss the possibility of cooperation between related South African and Louisiana industries.

The congressmen were especially interested in the possibilities of assisting Louisiana companies export products to South Africa. Louisiana is economically depressed and has the highest unemployment rate of any state in the country. Therefore, the Congressmen thought it would serve a dual purpose to help Louisiana manufacturers increase exports while helping South Africa receive American products that would help its economy remain strong and produce more jobs.



Met with Mr. Preston White, president of the Chrispus Attucks Society, an organization of young black men and women, to discuss their interest in the South Africa issue. We offered our assistance in helping them arrange a visit to South Africa for several of their members. We also encouraged them to include articles about the effects of sanctions on blacks in South Africa in their newsletter.

Added the names of members of the Chrispus Attucks Society to the Embassy mailing list so they can receive the regular mailings of letters from the Ambassador.

Responded to a State Department request for information about two organizations in South Africa.

Responded to an invitation to attend the 4th World Wilderness Congress in Colorado. Several prominent South Africans were expected to participate in the event, Including Dr. Ian C. Player, head of the Wilderness Leadership School, Mr. Magqubu Ntombela, a Zulu tribal elder, and 20 to 30 professionals and concerned citizens.

Arranged for the Ambassador to host a reception on the opening day of the Congress as a way of taking advantage of the opportunity to meet with the members of the South African delegation.

Arranged a meeting between the Ambassador and Mr. Vance Martin, executive director of the 4th World Wilderness Congress.

Met with Mr. Bernie Yoh of Accuracy in Media to encourage them to continue to focus on South Africa issues in their regional conferences. AIM holds four to six regional conferences, and several smaller ones, each year.

Met with Dr. William B. Allen, professor of Government at Harvey Mudd College, and a member of the U. S. Civil Rights Commission, to encourage him to visit South Africa on a fact-finding mission.

Responded to a request for information about development opportunities in southern Africa from a minority owned development company in New York, Dimpex Associates. Dimpex is a major contractor in Africa for the Agency for International Development.

Provided the Embassy with a list of black church leaders in America.

Provided names of competent, objective speakers who could speak at Southern Methodist University.

Talked with Mr. Ted Baehr of the Atlanta-based radio program, "Religion Wise." Mr. Baehr wanted to inform us that he has planning a trip to South Africa and wanted to get suggestions about possible activities and contacts there.

Met with Mr. Bob Grant of Christian Voice to discuss South Africa and U. S. policy toward South Africa.

Facilitated contact between Mr. Mark Heaton of the National Student Federation of South Africa and Mr. Mike Murvihill of Northern Illinois University, who wanted Mr. Heaton to visit his campus and make a speech to the students there.

Met with Mr. Walter Stafford of the Louisiana Association of Business and Industry to discuss trading opportunities between black Louisianans and black South Africans.

Talked with Mr, Paul B. Joseph, a black businessman from Houston, about his plans to organize a trip for more than 300 black Americans to visit Bophuthatswana for that country's 10th Independence celebration.

Met with Mr. Martin Henrichs, head of the Leadership Councils of America.

Met with Mr. Frank Donatelli, White House political director.

Met with Chief Jeremiah D. Mishoeshoe, Counselor Selwyn Soquinase, and Counselor Bam Siboto of the Republic of Transkei Information Office in Washington.

Met with Mr. Ian Robb of the First National Bank of Southern Africa.

Met with Miss Darlene Jackson, executive director of the National Black Republican Council.

Met with Mr. Elijah Ndungane and Mr. Menzo Barrish, representatives of the South Africa Sports Association for the Physically Disabled, to discuss their efforts to raise money for their programs in Soweto.

Talked with Mr. William Reed, business editor of the Capitol Spotlight newspaper, about his appearance on a prominent talk show, "The Daily Drum," on the Howard University radio station. Shared information with him about current events in South Africa and about positive signs of movement toward major reform in South Africa.

Arranged and attended a meeting between Mr. Reed and the Ambassador at the Embassy.

Talked with Mr. William Hoar, Senior Editor of Conservative Digest, about publisher William Kennedy's establishment of a bureau in South Africa.

Provided a copy of a speech by Pennsylvania State Representative Ron Gamble to the American Legislative Exchange Council and encouraged them to contact him. We also encouraged them to forward copies of State Rep. Gamble's speech to their members.

The speech discussed the unfairness of he Pennsylvania disinvestment action that was under consideration.

Following the speech, Pennsylvania's House of Representatives amended the disinvestment bill by adding Rep. Gamble's language requiring disinvestment of the state's pension funds from not only South Africa but also from every country in the world in which there are abuses of human rights. After inclusion of the amendment, the disinvestment bill failed.

Talked with attorney and consultant Philip Hare about efforts to attract amacus briefs in the Baltimore local disinvestment case which was under appeal to the Maryland Court of Appeals.

After talking with Mr. Hare, contacted Mr. Ernest Heuter, president of the National Legal Center for the Public Interest in Washington.

The National Legal Center had published a document in February 1985 entitled, "Disinvestment: An Analysis of Politicizing Investment Decisions." The document contained papers by several prominent Americans. They included William G. Milliken, who retired in 1983 as Michigan's longest serving Governor; Derek C. Bok, president of Harvard University and former dean of the Harvard Law School; Albert D. Blaustein, a world-renowned constitutional authority who worked as a consultant in the preparation of constitutions in Liberia, Zimbabwe, Peru, Bangladesh, and other countries; and other legal scholars.

Also contacted Mr. Dan Popeo, president of the Washington Legal Foundation, about his organization preparing and submitting an amacus brief.

Met with Mr. Brett Fuller, Washington area had of Maranatha Ministries, a conservative Christian ministry geared toward young adults and college students.


In a previous issue of Maranatha's publication, The Forerunner, was featured a cover story which focused on the tremendous amount of good will that exists between black and white Christians in South Africa.

Talked with student leaders at several universities including the University of North Carolina, Northern Illinois University, Southern Methodist University, and others.

Communicated with Mr. James J. Valenti, chairman of the League of Independent Voters in New Haven, Connecticut.
